Opening Sentences (Peter)

Our help is in the name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth. In life and in death we belong to God. Baptized into Christ's death we live unto him.

"If we live, we live unto the Lord and if we die, we die unto the Lord. So then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lords."

Welcome and Opening Prayer (Peter)

In the early Christian traditions, All Saint's Day was a day for religious leaders to honor those titled "saints" and those who had passed on from their earthly life into their eternal life. In the reformed church, we don't just honor those titled saints. We recognize that all people are important; all are a part of God's family, and all are to be celebrated.

So... Today, we gather to celebrate believers of every time, with a special focus in honoring the faithful who have died during the past year in our own church community. Today is a day of gratefulness for those that have passed away who shared their faith with us, and a time to reflect on how we can continue to share our faith with others. Today, we not only remember those who have gone before us, but we anticipate the life promised to us all in Christ Jesus. It is a day when we remember that the line that separates life and death is not as stark as we sometimes assume. In Christ, we celebrate that not even death can sever the ties that bind us to one another and to all our ancestors in the faith. Nor can anything separate us from the love of God- the God who grants us visions, sparks our imaginations, and kindles our hope- the God who keeps every good promise.

Let us pray: Eternal God, you have knit your people of all times and places into one communion in the mystical body of our Lord Jesus Christ. Grant us your Holy Spirit of encouragement and strength so we may persevere in our leg of the relay race of faith until such time as we join the great cloud of witnesses who cheer us on the Way. Keep us one with all who proclaim your gospel until such time as we finish our race, collapsing into your arms where you wait for us at the finish of your new creation begun in Christ, the pacesetter and perfecter of the way, the truth, and life everlasting. In the name of Jesus Christ, who was born, lived, died, and rose again for all your children of every time and place. Let all God's people say... Amen.
